A Letter from the Director



Summer is here! While the temperatures have been increasing, our options for staying cool have also increased from this time last year and our COVID numbers are becoming more manageable (fingers crossed!) Movie theatres, Now that we are, hopefully, on the other side of the worst of the COVID crisis, it is time to turn our attention back to all the public health issues we had been addressing, as well as a few that will surely be exacerbated post-COVID. Smoking, vaping, addiction, and mental health concerns are a few of the challenges we will be focused on going forward. I am fond of pointing out that in public health, most of it is interconnected. From pre-natal through the quality of the lives of our elderly, the public health community has a role to play. Oftentimes, these roles have been played out in silos resulting in less than stellar outcomes.

The Partnership is committed to building bridges to each silo and working in tandem to achieve the best results. We have over 20 years of experience with tobacco prevention. It is the perfect example of interconnectivity: pre-natal exposure to tobacco, either directly or secondhand, may cause distress to the fetus and/or low birthrate infants. Long term exposure may cause chronic illnesses and/or exacerbate pre-

pools, shopping, concerts, beach-going are all available to us again but with these re-opened opportunities comes responsibility. Here in Mississippi, we have reached a 30% vaccination rate – which is good news; however, we are far below the national average and are in fact in last place among states in some reports.

The Partnership for a Healthy Mississippi will be working on an initiative to raise awareness of the importance of being vaccinated, especially our youth. This effort be led by our terrific Youth Programs staff: Keimyra, Karissa and Olivia. They are tremendously talented, hard-working and energetic. Be on the lookout for the creative output of our Youth Board as they utilize all forms of communication tools to encourage their peers to get protected from COVID and to live healthier lives.

Featured Story: Secondhand Smoke Presentation

Shanna Barrett, MTFC Project Director for the Amite, Pike, and Wilkinson counties, presented a Secondhand Smoke Presentation to the Pike County Sheriff Department. Thirty-six employees participated in the presentation. The participants were very engaged and were interested in all information offered.

The participants discussed the high-stress levels that come with working in law

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enforcement, where most identified stress as the reason that most of them use some form of tobacco. Some of the participants have tried to quit numerous times, prompting Barrett to provide each participant with resources and information they can use to stop using tobacco products.


Youth Leaders
